890 BALLOTS CAST BY RESIDENTS NOTWITHSTANDING SPIRITLESS CAMPAIGNING

200 Attend Coronation Dinner - 3,000 Witness Crowning

Dick Jones of Doris Lane with 490 votes, and Frieda Rumpel of East Market Street, with 533 votes, were elected King and Queen of the 1934 Rockaway Point Mardi Gras, last Monday (Labor Day) by a majority residents vote.

"Singing" Georgie Pickett of lower Reid Avenue, and Barbara Starrett of Ocean Avenue were acclaimed Prince and Princess.

Fire Headquarters, Reid Avenue, which housed the lone polling sta-

tion, all day resembled a national convention with hundreds of candidates, Managers, Runners, and Rooters creating a hue and cry which prevailed throughout the day.

Precisely at 5:00 P. M., Chairman of the Mardi Gras Henry Kisker, ordered the fire bell to be rung, which closed the election and served to give the campaigners a much needed rest after a week of hectic campaigning.

Ken Jackson was several hundred votes behind Jones for King, closing with a total of 228.

Chet Anderson, another King candidate was third with 160 votes.

In the race for Queens honors, Eleanor McHugh, who at first loomed as a winner averaged 319 votes.

Eugene Sisti, a Prince candidate, closed with 155 votes.

Marilyn Sempell, who took her defeat graciously and as a matter of course, was close on the heels of the newly elected Princess. Her total votes showed 347.

Beirlein New Mayor

Gus Beirlein of East Market St., was acclaimed newly elect Mayor.

His defeated opponent, Bill Neibling, who reigned last year as Mayor, put up his usual spirited campaign and many believed Neibling would have made a better showing had he not already held the post.

Beirlein's tallies showed 538 to Neibling's 336.

All told, 890 ballots were cast and recorded by the Committee.

5,000 WITNESS BREEZY POINT CARNIVAL; PRIZES AWARDED TO MASQUERADERS AND FLOATS

Over 700 adults and children participated in the Carnival arrayed in pageant arrayed costumes. At least a hundred others were drawn on elaborate and prize winning floats.

The procession, led by John A. Brennan, Secretary of the Association, and a fifty-piece band, commenced at 3:00 P. M. and started from Ocean Avenue and Oceanside west to the end of the Point, thence to Kennedy's Casino and returning passed the grand stand where five non-resident judges had a trying time adjudging the prize winners.

Renie McGovern was selected best dressed in division 1 to 3 years, dressed as Mae West.

Georgie Devine, as "Tarzan," won the Most Original prize.

Billy Parrot, captured the third award.

Nanette Sombor in "Baby, Take A Bow," caught the eye of the judges for Best Dressed in group 3 to 6 years.

Vincent Cullerton, as "Buck Rogers" was the second prize winner.

June Madel, as the "Mechanical Man," captured third prize.

"Spanish Dancer" in class 6 to 10 years.

Marion Peters, in little "Orphan Annie" won second award.

Billy Jacobson, was third prize winner, arrayed as "The Black Bird."

Every one of the seven hundred children received consolation prizes which when using them will remind them during the winter months of the great day.

The Committee were further lauded for their pleasing invitation, which showed members of practically every organization parading.

The Point News will offer two silver loving cup trophies to the newly acclaimed champions.

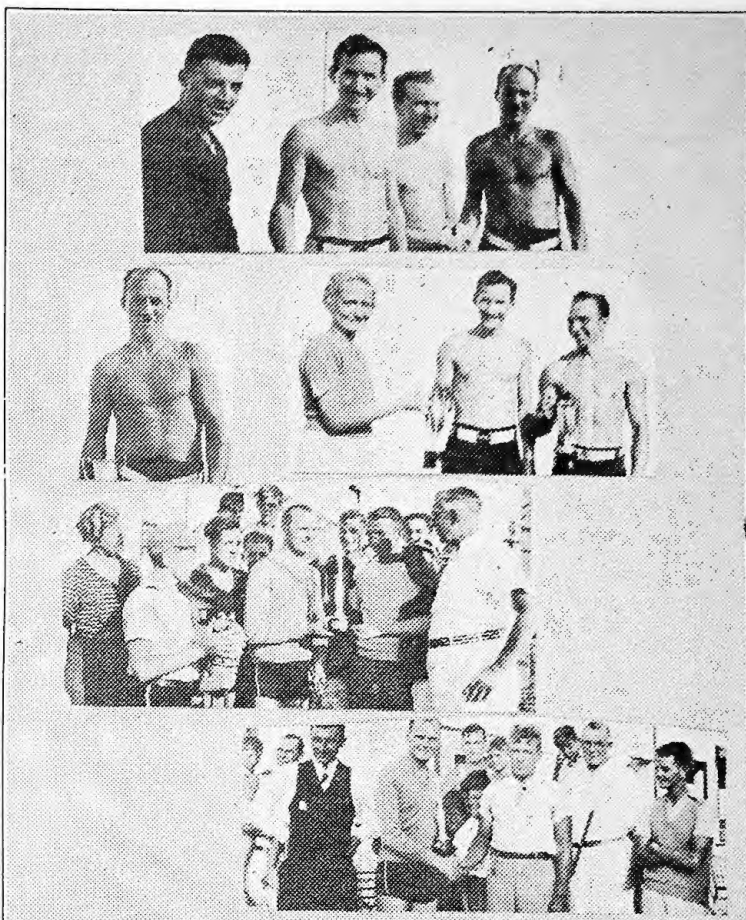
FAIRWEATHER STARS AS "KANDY KIDS" TRIUMPH

ALONG THE OCEANSIDE

By EVERETTUS

Yes Sir! Along the Oceanside, from Arcadia Walk to Fulton Walk were paraders from all walks, ready to march and when they did step off, a riot of color met the eyes of spectators along the entire route. A bevy of beauty; costumes weird, grotesque, imaginative; all enjoyable . . . but particularly outstanding was "Our Fleet," a study in white and blue, led by Vincent Daniels, leader of the orchestra at Kennedy's Casino. In immaculate white uniforms, girls of Breezy marched along wearing satin sashes bearing the names of the boats of the Rockaway Transportation Company . . . The "Commander" by Irene Toomey, "Columbia" by Margaret Flanagan, "Neponset" by Virginia Myers, "Uncle Sam," by Gloria, the "Fredrick Lundy" by Lucille Boland, and marching alone at rear center, Evelyn Wehlan of Sea Breeze Avenue, wearing the sash "Manhattan" and bearing aloft a very fine drawing of the "Commander." Evelyn, made this drawing in two days and all who saw it expressed their admiration for her work, particularly, Mr. and Mrs. Philip H. Reid, honored guests in the reviewing stand.

After the parade, the girls were presented at Kennedy's, they sang "East Side West Side" a la revue, and then led by an American Legion Band, they boarded the "Neponset." On the way to Sheepshead Bay, they saluted passing craft, and were saluted in return. With Vincent Daniels still in command they stood in formation on the dock at Sheepshead, saluted the officers and men, and formally presented the drawing of the "Commander," to Commodore Frank Maier, of the Transportation Company, who thanked the girls and declared that the drawing would appear on the walls of the new Ferry House to be erected when the widening of Emmons Avenue is completed.

While marching at the end of the parade behind Miss Wehlan, I remarked to John I. McCarthy, Treasurer of the Mardi Gras Committee, that the girls selected the right boat for the drawing. The "Commander" was loaned to the Navy Department for the duration of the World War, by the late Philip Howard Reid, father of our Vice-President. It was designated the "Section Patrol 1247," and as your writer remembers, was used in local waters, equip with a reel, a stern, and from the reel an observation balloon ascended. Also the "1247," served dangerously close to the explosion of the Gillespie Ammunition Works, New Jersey, 1918, carrying wounded and ill to Manhattan Hospitals. The crew of the "1247" also were on guard duty in the stricken area at that time for a stretch of 18 hours. So you folks who commute aboard the "Commander" are passengers aboard a very noteworthy craft. And the above description of its service is true, for I have been told the details by her former Commander. These details and many others concerning activities at the Point are still being compiled by your scribe for publication . . . when more prosperous times return. Meanwhile, we are creating material for this history, for in each issue of your Rockaway Point News, you will find interesting events. 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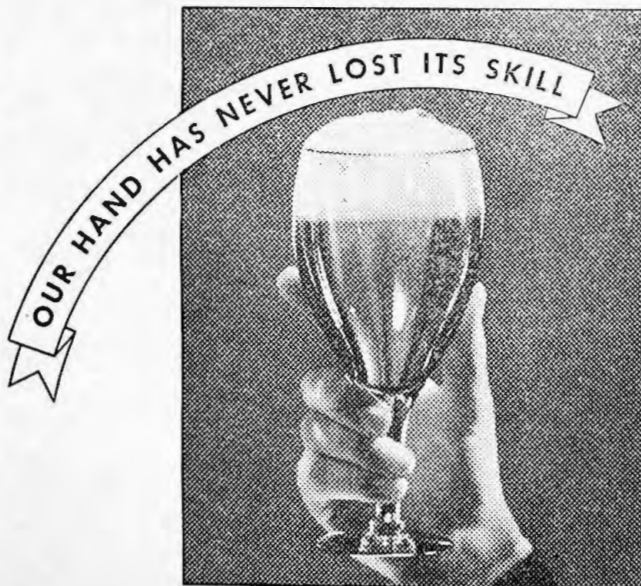

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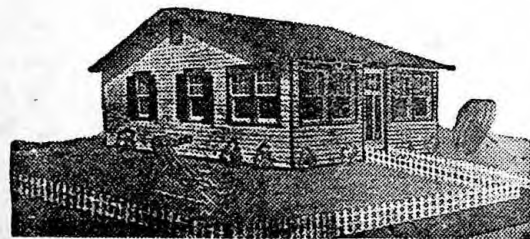
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
