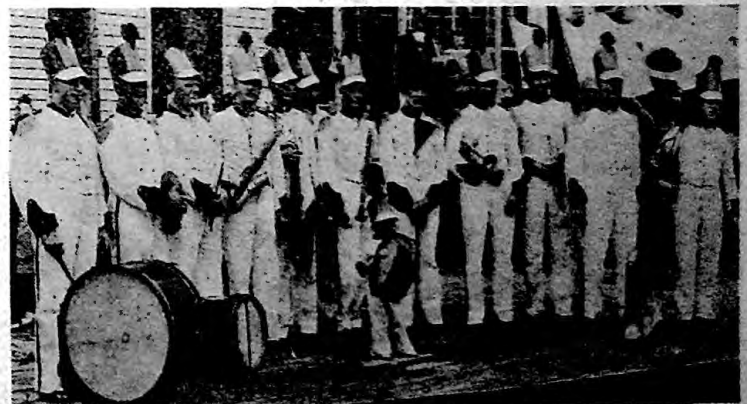
At the conclusion of the parade, prizes were awarded to the winners

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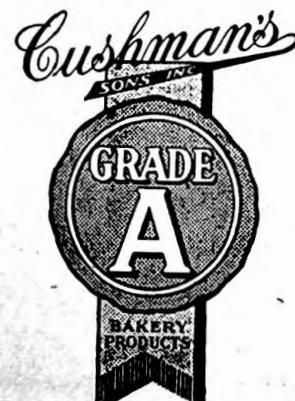

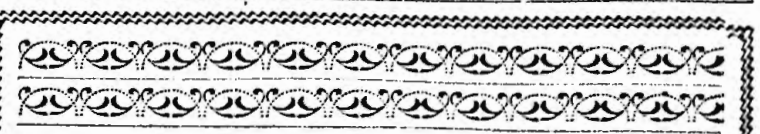
**Thetford Lane Holds 14th Block Party**
