ROXBURY CONCLUDES SEASON WITH IMPRESSIVE THREE-DAY MARDI GRAS

Roxbury bowed out the season of 1951 with a bang-up three-day Mardi Gras that ended Labor Day with a colorful and impressive round of fun, mirth and congeniality beginning from Saturday when the children had their parade and frolic coupled with ice cream, favors and prizes for masqueraders and group carnival array.

Sunday was the grand carnival with hundreds of men and women competing in mask array which included most original dressed, funniest, and best dressed in singles, and groups.

Monday came the mammoth outdoor sports in races, athletics, and water sport contests.

Congratulations to Chairman Herbert Schlecht, Henry Meyer, Harold Stringhan, Martha Johnston, Charles Waters and the balance of the committee who comprised three members from each organization for the splendid manner in which the Mardi Gras was arranged.

The Mardi Gras opened Saturday with the raising of the American Flag by Walter Cook, president of the People's Association who sponsored the carnival at the Children's parade grounds and which close to 400 children in masquerade costumes were adjudged for which included, Floats, Most Original, Most Comical. Individuals were appraised in the same order and prizes also awarded to grouped children in novelty dress.

Refreshments, favors were distributed to all kiddies.

The music was under the direction of the Linotype Post Drum Corps, and the Gladiola.

Sunday, came again the raising of the American Flag by Mayor Simpson, followed by the mammoth parading of adults from the new oval around the walks and beaches and return to the oval.

The youngsters of the beach are requested to enter the Colony Inn only in the afternoon to vie at the 100 prize awards.

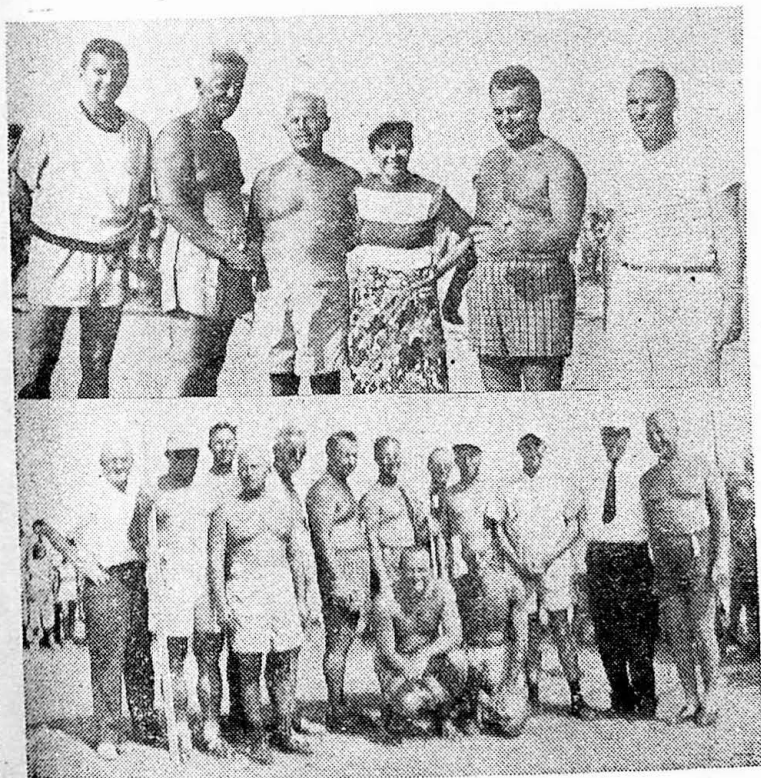
In the evening the adults will also go for the more than 150 gifts

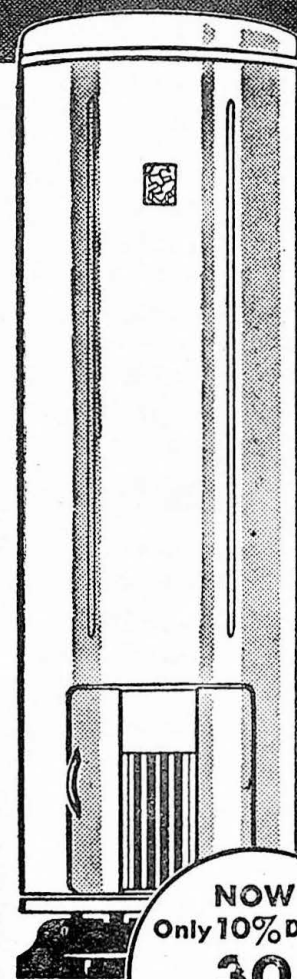

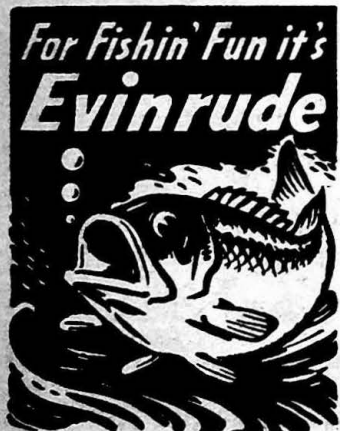
