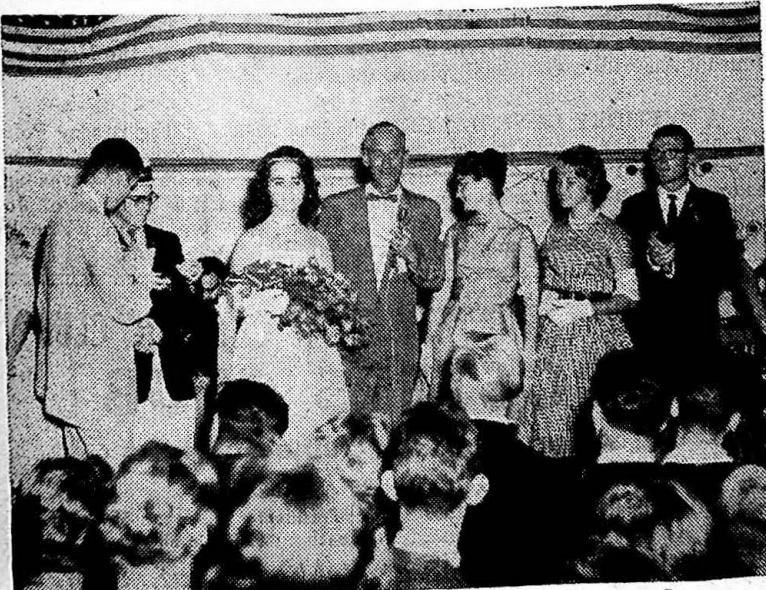

### Roxbury 3-Day Mardi Gras Opens Saturday

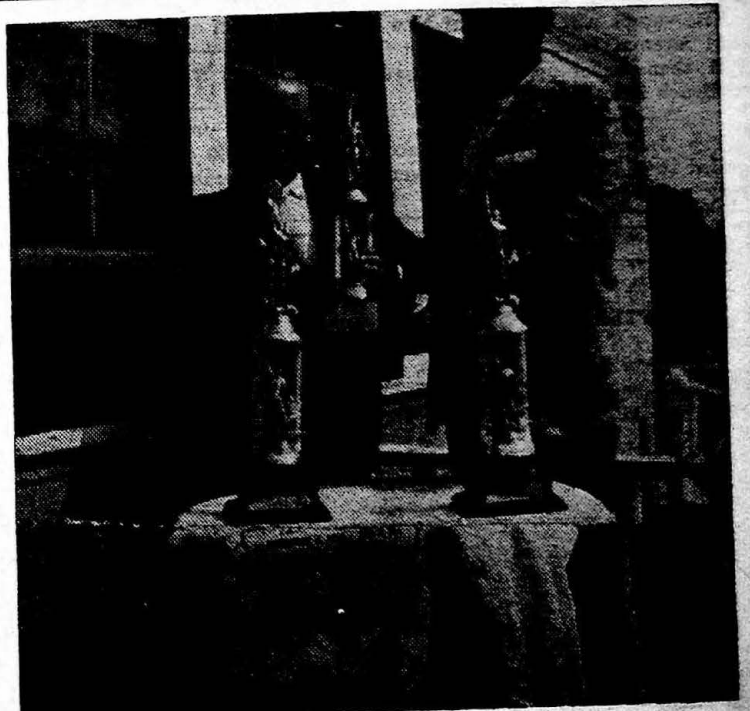
The annual 3-day Roxbury Mardi Gras opens Saturday with Children's Day.

## Christ Community Church Chronicle ("E Pluribus Unum Per Christum")

A more than hearty welcome is extended next Sunday to an old friend of Christ Community Church and its worshippers, the Rev. Alfred Grant Walton, D.D., of the Flatbush Tompkins Congregation Church in Brooklyn. This will be his nineteenth visit to us, his last being in 1955, and was to have occupied the pulpit in 1956 but in that year he was unfortunately hospitalized and his visit to us, perforce, cancelled. It was always a delight to our congregation to hear Dr. Walton's discourses and to those who are members in later years, his appearance and talk will be received with hearty appreciation. The Rev. Alfred Grant Walton graduated from Oberlin in 1911 with an A.B. and since then has earned an A.M. at Columbia, a B.D. at Oberlin Theological Seminary, a D.D. at Oberlin, an L.L.D. at American International and an L.N.D. at Kalamazoo. He has been with his present pastorate for 26 years, his previous ones being at Pilgrim Congregational Church, St. Louis; First Congregational Church, Stanford, and Hope Congregational Church, Springfield. He was also radio preacher for 15 years on the NBC network on programmes sponsored by the Federal Council of Churches, is presiding officer or member on various boards dealing with the dissemination of the Word, in hospitals for the blind and chaplain of the famous Brooklyn Apollo Club. Altogether a very busy, untiring and zealous servant of God.

Youth Service in the Church next Sunday will be under the direction of Mr. William A. Metz, a member of the Church Choir and known to all in Church activities. This service commences at 9:15 A.M. and specially serviced for younger folks who are in years above the Sunday School age. Urge your boy or girl to attend.

Sunday School also commences at 9:15 A.M. in the Church Hall and is staffed by competent and dedicated teachers to the task of furthering religious education to the children here. Enroll your child as soon as you can as the season is waning. Visitors welcome.

Remember, when you down screens, up shutters your bungalow, get rid of oily rags, store your paint and flammable liquids properly.

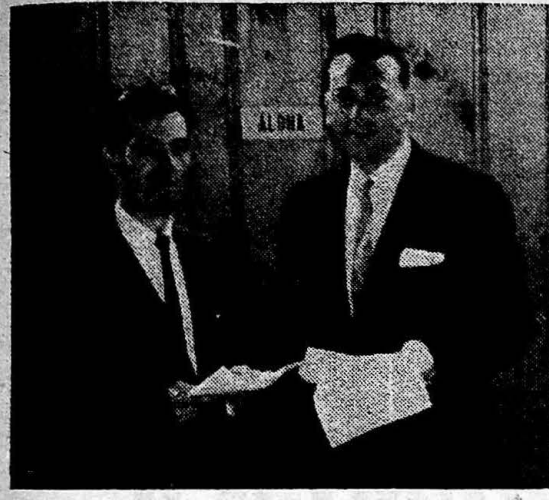

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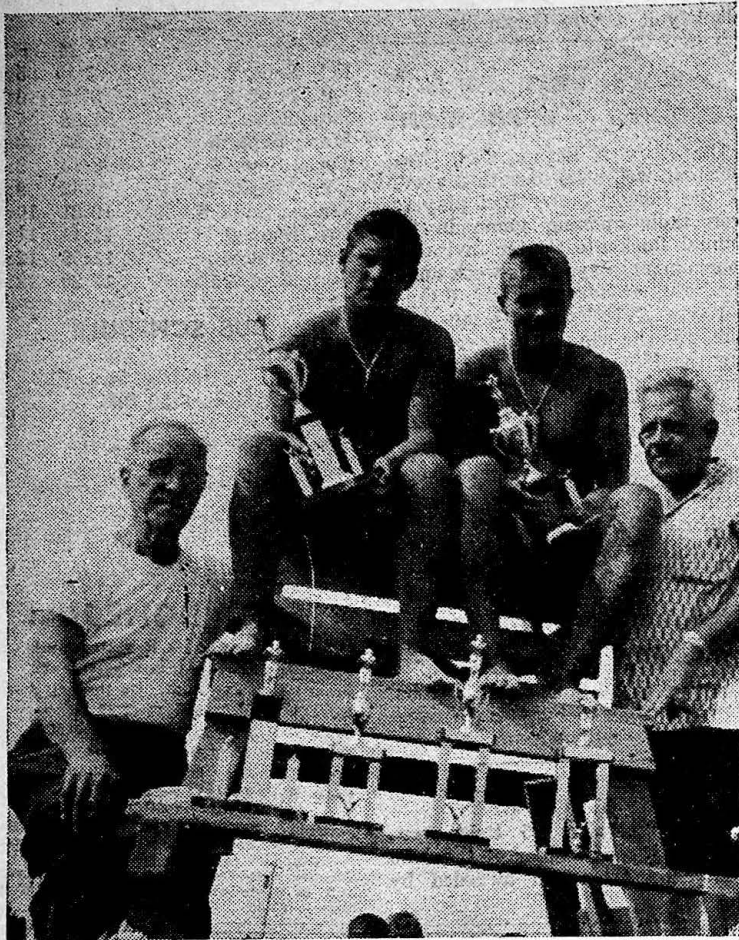
